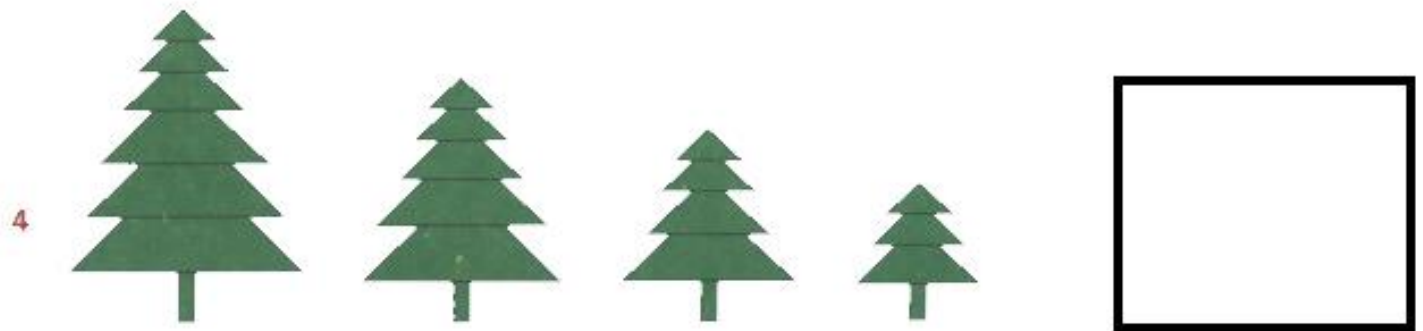
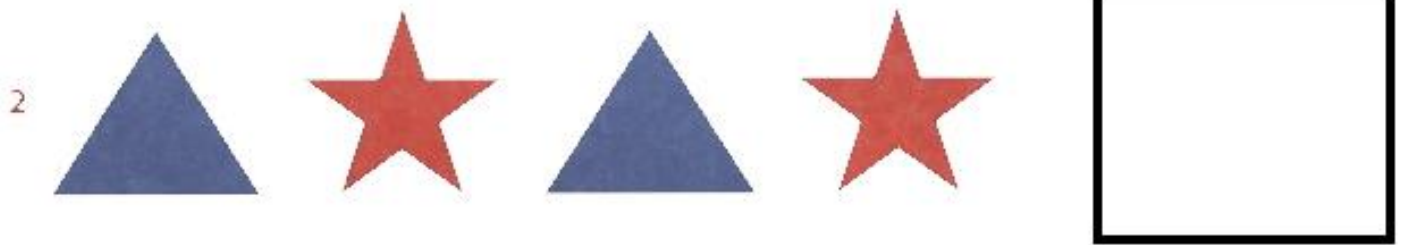


PROBLEM 1

How many girls do you see in this picture? How many dolls are there? Is the number of dolls the same as the number of girls? How many balloons are there? (Bonus: count the balloons). Are there more balloons than dolls? Are there fewer dolls than balloons? Color the leftmost balloon in blue. Color the rightmost balloon in green. Color the balloons red that are between the blue and the green balloons. Count: How many balloons are colored in blue? How many balloons are colored in red? Are there more red balloons than green balloons? Are there fewer blue balloons than red ones?



Problem 2. What comes next? Figure out the pattern and try to draw the answer inside the empty box



Let's make up a story! At home, look at a picture with your child and name everything together. Imagine it's a boy's 3rd birthday, and his friends are coming. Give names to the toys in the picture. Ask questions like, 'Where should Teddy sit?' The first day, just one word is okay, like 'table.' The next day, use a whole sentence, like 'The boy will sit at the table.' On the third day, ask about colors, like, 'What color is Teddy's chair?' If it's 'red,' say, 'Teddy will sit on the red chair.' Remember, every answer is great!
